March 6 - 7:00pm - Kraft Chapel


March 6th marks the beginning of the Lenten season. This is a 40 day observance period when we remember and reflect on the days of Jesus fasting and praying. We find the description of this time in the scriptures of Matthew and Luke. However, Jesus would not be alone on this private journey; rather, the Tempter would be present offering alternatives messages, as Jesus was focusing on his God. We too may choose to do some form of intentional fasting and praying during this time, as well.





Ash Wednesday is the day which marks the beginning of this season. Many traditions will open their houses of worship for a simple service, as folks center themselves on remembrance, the Lenten season begins. Many will choose their own ways to acknowledge their personal journey with Christ

Hearing in Color and Seeing Clearly: Recap

Outreach Ministry and the Young Adult Initiative sponsored a successful weekend of art and reflection around race and the legacy of Martin Luther King, Jr. On Saturday, February 2, over 100 people attended a concert organized by Chancel Choir baritone **LaRob Payton**. The first half of the concert, directed by LaRob, featured choir pieces, solos by **Leah Dexter** and **Joelle Lamarre**, and the string quartet Chicago Solisti. The music grappled with themes of endurance and victory in the face of unimaginable suffering. The second half of the concert featured original arrangements of spirituals by **Adrian Dunn** performed by his musical group, the Adrian Dunn Singers. Some of the arrangements were inspired by the lives and deaths of Trayvon Martin, Eric Garner, and Tamir Rice. The concert ended with the powerful group singing of the message that "I am more than a conqueror."



Our ears and hearts were still ringing with this music as we gathered Sunday after-

noon to discuss healing and organizing in the face of racism. **Rev. Dr. Marie Onwubuariri** shared a reflection on her recent trip to Burma, explaining how conversations around race shaped her personal identity and vocational discernment. She discussed the necessity of peeling back layers of colonialism in order to cultivate self-love. She then led self-reflective exercises on the experience of being a talker and listener in conversations about race.

Paw Say Ku led a workshop that delved into understanding trauma and the importance of active listening as a tool for evoking stories that can help heal trauma. In her workshop, the group reflected on how successful active listening is shaped by context. The stories that we tell and the way we receive them- whether with nods, affirming interjections, or by sitting in silence- depends on our culture of origin and the culture of the space in which we find ourselves.

Rev. Dr. Janette Wilson led a lively conversation on the resurgence of white supremacy in the 21st century. The group reflected on how they first experienced themselves as belonging to a certain race, and the first time they encountered someone of another race. They considered possibilities for building more cross-racial, cross-cultural spaces of conversation and relationship.

Day of Remembrance 2019



On February 17, 2018, in spite of the inclement weather, many came to attend the Day of Remembrance 2019. The keynote speaker of this year was Karen Korematsu, Founder and Executive Director of the Fred Korematsu Institute. Karen is the daughter of the late Fred Korematsu who is famous for his court case, "Korematsu vs. United States" which took place in 1944.

One memorable episode she shared with us during her speech was that she and her brother never knew about her father's trial while they were growing up and they learnt about it for the first time at their high school. Seen as a trouble maker even by his own community, he had to keep silent for a long time although he always believed in his heart that one day he would be vindicated.

As "Never Again is Now" was the theme of this year's Day of Remembrance, the attendees were reminded once again how important it is to speak up for justice today. The unique courage of Korematsu which eventually led him to his honor (he received

the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1998) is truly a wonderful legacy for all. ~ Pastor Yuki
