

112th Annual Meeting

On Sunday, May 20, the church will once again gather to celebrate Pentecost with a joint worship service at 10:30 am, followed by a shared meal and our annual meeting at 12:00 pm. Olga Diaz is arranging what promises to be a wonderful luncheon.

It has been almost two years since the church, and the English congregation in particular, entered a period of pastoral interim. During that time, the Karen Fellowship has also entered an interim period, with the retirement of Pastor Roger. We have accomplished much in those two years. We have reflected on the church's vision and hopes for the future in conversation with the pastoral search committee. We have hosted two Martin Luther King, Jr. Day conferences, and begun "Wednesdays at Jerry's" gatherings and Friday night Bible studies. We have taken new steps in our online communications, creating a new website, Facebook group, and weekly e-mail updates. We have embarked upon the Young Adult Initiative,





All of these new endeavors are the fruit of a larger discernment process about who we are and who we are becoming as a church. During our joint worship, Pastor David will be offering a sermon that reflects upon all of the growth and learning that we have done on this interim journey together these past two years. We will also be extending the right hand of fellowship to five new members.

During the Annual Meeting, as always, we will recognize our Faithful Servant and scholarship recipients. This year, we will also celebrate the

work of New Alternatives. For many years, New Alternatives provided social and spiritual support to NSBC's senior community and outreach to the wider neighborhood through a variety of gatherings and outings. We will also be honoring Margo Bach for her faithful leadership of this ministry.

In addition to receiving annual ministry reports and voting on a new slate of leaders for 2018-19, we will also be voting on a constitutional amendment to establish an all-church Outreach Ministry. See the article inside for an explanation and text of the amendment.

We look forward to doing this important work and celebrating the presence of the Holy Spirit among us on May 20!

Outreach Ministry - Constitutional Amendment

As we continue to develop our communications with the wider community via online and social media, the pastoral team and Church Council have discussed the best way to integrate this ministry into the life and structure of the church. We decided that social media ministry is far enough outside the scope of existing Ministries that establishing a new Ministry would be in order. This Ministry would not only oversee the so-

cial media work of the church, but also build upon the vision and desire of NSBC to do more to connect with members of the community. This desire came across clearly in the reflections the church did last year as we began to think about who we are and who we would like to become, as we looked for a new English Language Pastor.

The purpose of the Ministry will be to oversee church communications (particularly via online and social media) and to develop programming that draws in members of the communities around NSBC. It will consolidate the work of two existing task forces: the **Social Media Task Force** and the **Martin Luther King, Jr. Day Task Force**. It will also oversee the new project/s developed through the Young Adult Initiative in which NSBC is currently participating. In 2019, the budget for the Ministry will be created out of present funds designated for the work of these two task forces. As part of her work on social media and community formation, Pastor Kathryn will serve as the liaison from the Pastoral Team to this Ministry.

We will be voting on the amendment to establish this Ministry at the **Annual Meeting on Sunday, May 20**. The amendment would add the following section to:



Article IX (Work of the Church Council and Ministries)

Section 13. Outreach Ministry Outreach Ministry shall be responsible for the communication of church vision, programs, and events with surrounding communities and the inclusion of those communities in church life.

The work of this ministry shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- A. Develop and oversee the social media and online presence of the church.
- B. Generate content pertaining to church life and regularly share content via selected social media platforms and other advertising methods, as appropriate.
- C. Periodically assess effectiveness of advertising, social media, and other online communication methods, and adjust strategies as needed.
- D. Develop church programming aimed at including members of the wider community in the life of the church.
- E. In cooperation with the annual budget process, present to the Stewardship Ministry a recommended Outreach budget for the following fiscal year.
- F. Monitor on a regular basis expenditures of budget line items related to Outreach Ministry.

Priscilla Eppinger Receives Honor

The Rev. Dr. Priscilla Eppinger was inducted into the Martin Luther King, Jr., College of Ministers and Laity at Morehouse College in a ceremony in Atlanta on April 4. Priscilla, a former Minister with Young Adults here at NSBC (1998-2002), has served for the past two years as the executive director of the American Baptist Historical Society, the oldest and most extensive Baptist archive in the United States. According to the American Baptist News Service, the MLK, Jr., College of Ministers and Laity was created "to honor individuals whose life and work exemplify the ethical ideals promoted by the College's most prominent alumnus, Martin Luther King, Jr. Nominees to the College of Ministers and Laity have demonstrated and are evolving toward great achievement in their chosen vocations, a profound commitment to their community and society, the planet, and the cosmos, and are living their lives according to a high standard of cosmopolitan ethical principles."
