Giving Today, Giving Tomorrow

One of our fall events is the annual pledge drive, during which we invite the members and friends of North Shore Baptist Church to consider their plan for financial giving to the church in 2018. This year, we are going to be talking about two different kinds of giving, "Giving Today and Giving Tomorrow." Think of this as "Today Money" and "Tomorrow Money."



"Everyone has something to offer."

Today Money is what we usually think about at pledging time. It helps the church a lot when people are able to plan ahead and make a pledge, so the church can also plan ahead. If you let us know what you plan to give, we can anticipate the resources available for mission and ministry in the coming year.


One of the great blessings of this church is that, because of our financial endowments, we can afford to be in ministry with everyone who comes. We don't have to "target" those who are financially well off, the way many churches do. Instead, we can include everyone, understanding that everyone has something to offer, in volunteer time, in passion and heart, in skills and experience they bring, and with whatever financial resources they have.

Of course, this does not mean that people don't need to give. Not at all! Annual pledged giving makes up a significant portion of our budget, and we are limited in our ministry when people do not give as much as they are able. But it is a sliding scale: what one person is able to pledge may be out of reach for another. So everyone is asked to pledge what they are able, and the ministry plans of the church will be made accordingly.

Tomorrow Money is the large, generational gifts people sometimes make, usually as part of their retirement and estate planning. With the aging of the baby boom generation, our culture is preparing for the largest transfer of wealth in history, the boomers passing on their legacies and inheritances. In our unequal society, some have little to pass on, others have comfortable nest eggs, still others have large estates. We want to spend some time this year talking about the opportunity people have to leave something of their estate, even something modest, to the church as a legacy. This legacy giving is "Tomorrow Money."

Tomorrow Money is used for projects that transcend the years. The upcoming renovation of Howel Hall and the Sanctuary are good examples: the gifts that fund them will serve our ministry for decades to come. Another example is when someone contributes to the Wilber Warner Trust or another church endowment: that money is preserved permanently and the interest supports ongoing projects and programs. When someone leaves a portion of their estate to the church, even five or ten per cent, it is a gift that will contribute to the ongoing, thriving ministry of the church throughout the years.

Tomorrow Money and Today Money are intimately related. The reason we can afford to do so much important ministry Today — with refugees & immigrants, meaningful worship, disaster recovery, mission trips, musical events, pastoral care, workshops & teach-ins, retreats — is because past generations provided for us: we are all the beneficiaries of their Tomorrow Money. Tomorrow Money from the past pays for ministry Today. And we will be exploring how we all can participate in "paying it forward," giving our own Tomorrow Money for the ministry of NSBC in the future.

So, right now, we are inviting you to think about your Today Money pledge: the more money we have pledged for the 2018 budget, the more ministry we can plan for. And in the coming weeks, we will be asking you to think about gifts and pledges of Tomorrow Money, and the many different ways you can support and contribute to the church and its ministries for years to come.

Pastoral Search Committee

After months of conversing with church members and collecting surveys, the Pastoral Search Committee has put together a church profile and English Language Pastor position description. We are now moving into the second phase of the search process, in which we receive and review applications.

Overview: North Shore Baptist Church is a multi-racial, multi-lingual, inclusive community of faith on Chicago's north side. We are one church, four congregations worshipping in English, Spanish, Japanese and Sgaw Karen, building the beloved community week by week. Our pastoral team of five works collaboratively to serve the needs of their congregations while nurturing the whole church through quarterly worship services, annual picnics, weekly coffee hours, and cross-congregational committees. We are anchored in our generous, historic building, which is buzzing throughout the week with community and church events alike. We are rooted in our Baptist faith. Our congregants come from near and far in the city and travel far and wide through mission, service, and ABC-USA engagement. We are proud to partner with neighborhood interfaith and ecumenical initiatives addressing the needs of the most vulnerable while building a stronger community, and to have commissioned many pastors and missionaries from our walls. With a strong sense of heritage and history we are focused on the present and the future. With a clear commitment to diversity and equity we seek to deepen engagement across differences and nurture community within each of our four congregations.
